## **Local concerns over education**



I would first like to congratulate all local students who have recently received their exam results.

Despite clear warnings and the evidence from Scotland the Government pressed ahead with the application of an algorithm to standardise A Level results which caused an outcry when some of our best schools and students found their marks had been downgraded.

I was made aware of concerns by headteachers even before the publication of results and immediately lobbied ministers to put things right. A strong coalition of schools, parent and students forced the government to u turn but at the cost of a lot of distress to young people.

Unfortunately, the problems within education do not end there. During the pandemic when schools were looking to reopen, the Government largely negated their responsibility and left the hard decisions to individual Headteachers and Governing Bodies. In our area, which still has a three-tier system, there was no advice from Government at all, despite lobbying by myself and the local authority.

With the beginning of term fast approaching, we are still seeing the Government flip-flopping over safety measures such as the wearing of masks. I'm pressing the Government for further clarity on behalf of local schools and pupils. What is clear, is that local schools and teachers are doing the best job possible in making sure our children get the education they deserve.

# Self Employed Income Support Scheme

## Phase 2



The second phase of the Self-Employment Income Support Scheme is now open for applications.

If you were eligible for the first grant and can confirm to HMRC that your business has been adversely affected on or after 14 July 2020, you can make a claim for a second and final grant from 17 August 2020.

You can make a claim for the second and final grant if you're eligible, even if you did not make a claim for the first grant.

I am very concerned however at the looming jobs crisis across the UK as a result of the government's withdrawal of furlough from businesses in struggling sectors, and the high proportion of people working in these sectors in our area.

Retail has been the hardest hit by mass redundancies since the coronavirus pandemic struck, with manufacturing and aviation also badly affected. Tens of thousands of job losses have been announced and more redundancies are expected in these sectors, yet they have received no tailored support.

Here in the North East, 10% of the workforce work in retail, 11% in manufacturing and with many jobs linked to aviation and the travel industry it is becoming clear that the impact of decreasing government support is likely to be felt far more deeply by some areas of the UK. I am joining with other MP's from our region to call for a further package of targeted support.

## Tackling anti-social behaviour



I have welcomed the news that Northumbria Police have joined forces with partners to tackle an increase in reports of anti-social behaviour along the Metro network.

Named Operation Hermes the two-day initiative will see officers team up with colleagues from Metro operators Nexus, local councils, Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service and British Transport Police to target troublemakers and help ensure commuters feel safe.

The increased activity, which gets under way this weekend, ahead of the Bank Holiday, follows concerns from travellers relating to anti-social behaviour, including reports linked to young people gathering in groups in and around stations.

A wide range of tactics will be deployed across a number of locations, at times when there has been an increase in incidents being reported and will include increased engagement to steer youths away from using the stations as social hubs.

I understand enforcement action will be used where necessary, and as well as a visible policing presence, plain-clothed officers will be travelling the Metro lines keeping a watchful eye.

As part of Northumbria Police's continued commitment to tackling serious and organised crime, there will also be targeted search operations at some stations.

Over the past few months there have been a number of incidents anti-social behaviour including one in Shiremoor. I'd like to thank residents for their determination to tackle this and the police and local authority who have worked together to put measures in place to put a stop to this. Let me be clear, there is no place for anti-social behaviour in our area. If you have an issue in your area please do not hesitate to get in touch as action can be and will be taken.

I have been tabling parliamentary questions and contacting Ministers on behalf of both Tynemouth Aquarium and Whitley Bay Ice Rink which are now open

in a Covid safe way. I am pleased that both well loved local attractions have now been able to open. I would also like to thank all those local people who got in touch with me to campaign for their reopening.

## Newcastle United Takeover



Following the news that the Newcastle United takeover had fallen through a huge number of local people contacted me to raise their concerns about the actions of the Premier League.

I joined all regional MP's in writing to the Chief Executive of Premier League and the Sports Minister to highlight the valid concerns that had been raised over the handing of the situation. ## North Shields and Fish Quay Masterplan



Elected Mayor Norma Redfearn recently launched the council's 'Ambition for North Shields and the Fish Quay' masterplan.

The draft North Shields masterplan will be used to consult with residents, businesses and stakeholders and outlines nine separate projects for the town centre and Fish Quay to be developed.

These include enhancing the appearance of key areas, creating a new transport hub and interchange and town square to host events, markets and performances, improved walking and cycling routes in the town centre, a new

cultural quarter and riverside walkway linking the town centre to the Fish Quay.

## Happy Birthday to Metro

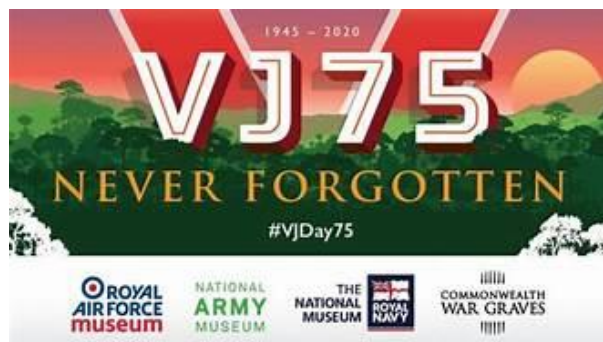


I was pleased to congratulate Metro earlier this month as it celebrated it's 40th anniversary.

## North Tyneside Carers' Centre

As lockdown measures ease and businesses start to reopen, I know that carers remain concerned about leaving their home and people coming into their home, due to the vulnerability of the people they care for. On top of that, many carers are unable to take a break from their caring responsibilities.

North Tyneside Carers Centre recently contacted me to ask me to remind people that they are still open for business, concentrating on emergency planning and wellbeing with carers through 1-2-1 telephone calls, email, Live Chat, virtual meetings and workshops.

### **Worries over domestic violence**

Northumbria Police and Crime Commissioner has recently warned, following meetings with local domestic abuse support services that referrals will soar when children head back to school this September.

Many services reported a worryingly low number of referrals during the peak of lockdown and many victim services are now reporting a sharp increase as the easing of lockdown enables more victims to reach out for help.

I am joining the PCC in her efforts to lobby the Government for a long-term funding commitment to deal with the problem holistically rather than the piecemeal approach we are currently seeing.
